Another first has come to Chicago! On March 18th a dedication service was conducted by Mr. Dean Blackwell, at the recently acquired church pastorate in Palos Park, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago.

Following the example set forth in II Chronicles 6 and Ezra 6 of the dedication of the temple, everyone present gathered together in the living room, while Mr. Blackwell, gave the dedicatory prayer. As in the example and record of King Solomon's prayer, Mr. Blackwell said in his prayer that because this house is deeded in God's name, it will be used for His glorification and the edification of the Church.

This house was formerly the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Mokarow (now in Pasadena), and is ideally suited for a combination office-residence.

The upper quarters consist of six spacious rooms in early American decor. The immense living room is accentuated by a white brick fireplace, colonial maple furniture set over a huge oval hand braided rug. The open kitchen blends in with knotty pine cabinets, and is equipped with the latest in modern conveniences, including an automatic dishwasher. The master bedroom is furnished in French Provincial, wild cherry wood furnishings, with a double sink; full ceramic tile bath adjoining.



This office is truly 2 blessing, for as this great work of God has grown 30% each year, so have the functions of Mrs. Blackwell's office, making this expansion necessary. It is a joy to behold the transformation from shoe boxes and apple boxes, to a neat, orderly file system set around a huge work desk.

Undoubtedly the biggest attraction of the pastorate is the big 2,000 book library open to all the Church. These books have all been purchased by Mr. Blackwell through the years, and make up a weil-balanced selection. A church member contributed the library furniture which by "coincidence" is identical to the furniture in the Ambassador College Library.

It was with intense appreciation and thankfulness, that those who came to the dedication went home knowing that God is caring for and blessing His Church, and providing those things necessary to accomplish His work.

Australian Story Continued — Part II

After considerable persuasion by Mr. Armstrong, the official in charge smugly agreed to grant visas IF they could complete the necessary exams and X-rays by closing hours at 4:30. After filling out some forms the time was 3:30 with the seeming impossible task ahead. At least a day and usually longer is necessary for such exams and X-rays . . . but they had one hour. Through an amazing chain of rapid-fire events, they were able to locate a physcian to give the exam who called a friend who was an X-ray specialist in the same building who immediately took and finished the films. Doubling up in these two activities and literally finishing dressing while on the run to the consulate, they arrived at exactly 4:30 p.m. The clerk meekly issued the visas.

Their Sydney-bound Quantas 707 jetliner left San Francisco at 1:30 a.m. November 10, 1959. The departure time was delayed 2 hours due to fog. The first stop . . . Honolulu. More time was spent

here than expected. Rather than being only a refueling stop before starting on the next leg of the trip to Canton Island, it turned out to be another delay. Four hours were spent in repairing the radio antenna.

In Canton they nearly had another delay while exploring an old World War II pontoon pier, they got absorbed in observing the various fish and the plane almost left without them.

Next stop — Fiji—and another delay. Fourteen hours were spent, actually spending the night there, while landing gear of the aircraft was being repaired (a mechanic had to be sent out from Sydney).

A special dessert ordered in Lautoka Hoted in Fiji was called 'Angels on Horseback'. What was served didn't exactly measure up to expectations—some sort of chilled combination of succulent tropical fruits. The 'Angels' turned out to be slithery slimy mussels wrapped in half-raw bacon. BARF! This resulted in such shocked amusement it was decided essential to repair to the room to photograph this delicacy.

First order of business upon arrival in Sydney, was a conference with Mr. R. K. Harris of A.W.A. who proved very helpful in the work to follow. Following this was an intensive search for adequate office space. For this God provided a copious part of the MLC Building in North Sydney. The lease for this was signed 7 December 1959. Partitioning of offices quickly followed.

Mr. Waterhouse was soon in his office and began meeting with business men and prospective members.

The first official meeting of brethren was held January 23, 1960, at Mr. Waterhouse's home at 45 Coolaroo Road, Lane Cove.

As the need for personnel continued, Mr. Charles Hefner arrived from the U.S. in late January to handle the copying of the "master" broadcast tapes sent from Pasadena.

Even with the addition of Mr. John Churchland and Mr. Don Abraham to the office staff, it was not possible to keep up with the rapid growth. Mr. and Mrs. Dexter Faulkner arrived from Pasadena to lend additional help . . . Mr. Faulkner in mail reading and Mrs. Faulkner as a typist and later telephonist.

Just before Passover 1960, after two previous moves, God opened to the Sydney Church a new meeting place — The Australian Institute of Builders' Hall at Milson's Point.
