FEAST plus HONEYMOON

Unlike most individuals who made the trip to Big Sandy, Texas, for the Feast of Tabernacles, my wife and I did a good deal of traveling before arriving at Big Sandy. Having only recently come into God's Church and having then been married even more recently, we took this opportunity of attending God's festival to also take a honeymoon down in the country of Mexico.

We left Milwaukee early on September 24, and arrived in Memphis that evening to spend the first Sabbath of our trip with Mr. and Mrs. Carl McNair and the people of the Memphis Church. Next stop was Oklahoma City, where we spent the Feast of Trumpets. From Oklahoma City, we headed for San Antonio, Texas, where we saw the Alamo and a number of missions and forts which played an important part in some of the early history of our country. Leaving San Antonio, we drove straight through to Monterrey, Mexico.

Having spent a day and two nights in Monterrey, we headed for Mexico City, some six hundred miles farther south. We found Mexico City to be the New York of Mexico. With its bustling population of nearly seven million and its gleaming skyscrapers of late model architecture, it surely ruined the image I had thus far gained of Mexico as being just a bit backward and underdeveloped—at least by most American standards.

While in Mexico City, we saw a bull fight and the Mexican Folklore Ballet, which was one of the most beautiful stage productions I have ever seen. We toured the ruins of the Aztec pyramids, wandered through a typical Mexican open market, went on a gondola ride through the Floating Gardens while being serenaded by the Mariachas, and ate dinner in a cave.

One experience that will stand out in our minds is our trip to the Shrine of Guadalupe, a famous Catholic basilica and center of worship in Mexico. Although we knew that 98 per cent of Mexico is Roman Catholic, we had no idea how obsessed these people were with their religion until we visited this shrine. Aside from the usual kneeling before various statues that one expects to see at such a shrine, we also saw numerous men and women, some with babies on their back, crawling on bare knees for a block to two blocks in order to fulfill a promise to the Women of Guadalupe for some favor she supposedly did for them. About this time I bowed my head and silently thanked God for bringing me out of this deceived and confused world and for the soon return of Jesus Christ.

While in Mexico City, we spent one day driving down to Taxco and back, which is about one-hundred miles south of Mexico City. Taxco is a quaint Mexican village, where buildings have to built to ancient specifications and life is still lived as it has been for hundreds of years. This town is characterized by narrow cobblestone streets and a great variety of small shops, all engaged in selling silver jewelry. Taxco is known as the silver capital of the world, being suurrouunded by many silver mines.

We arrived at Big Sandy on October 10 and set up our tent on the campsite reserved for us. We were much surprised and impressed with the size and development of the college campus at Big Sandy, and we certainly do count it a blessing
