1966 CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS!

Why do we have these minister's conferences? When did they begin? Why do we have them annually? What has been the fruit of these conferences? Did God's church previously hold such conclaves?

Here are the answers you need to know about these important questions.

When Did These Meetings Begin?

God's ministers first started convening in these annual meetings in January 1955. God's mark of approval was everywhere manifested in this first conference. There were exactly twelve ministers present in that first conference which was held after exactly 21 (3 x 7) years of the Philadelphian era of God's church. On the Sabbath during that conference, several ordinations took place which filled the offices in God's

church for the first time in 750 years. This occurred on January 22, when Sister Annie M. Mann became the first Deaconess in the modern era of God's church; the first Pastors were also ordained. They were Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong, Mr. Norman A. Smith, Mr. Wayne C. Cole, and Mr. Dean C. Blackwell. Since this time, the Sabbath during the ministerial conference has always

Years ago the average young American began his career with nothing but his wife and good intentions. Usually he started working for his father or some other man. Through diligence he was soon able to go into business for himself. Even so, he generally had to borrow money for a part of his working capital. Repayment was made in installments. This made possible his success. By thrift he was able to rear and educate his children and do his bit toward making America great.

This was as it should be, but alas, this practice changed. Soon this average American accumulated a sizeable fortune. With this affluence his children were not content with ways of the past. They wanted more and better things, not only necessities but luxuries. These were bought on installments. Many things were bought without need—ten dollars down and ten dollars weekly for the rest of their lives. Stores quickly adopted the plan.
